

Greetings in the name of Christ!

Looking at the weather, our worship team made a fairly last-minute decision this week to change our annual “outdoor worship service and potluck” to an “indoor worship service and potluck” – and as Sunday approached, it’s fair to say we weren’t quite sure what to expect with the change. And as Sunday ended, I’d say it’s fair to call it a smashing success. I don’t know if we’ll choose to return the potluck to outside next year, or if we’ll decide this year has started a new tradition – but I do know this: the love of Christ can be made known in many different ways at many different times, but perhaps there is no way in which we experience it more fully than we are gathered together at “the family meal” – when we share together the bread and wine, the promise of new life in Christ.



Being Willing to Try and Fail ... and Try Again by the Rev. Kirby Unti, Bishop, NWWA Synod

We are living in a time when change takes place so quickly that even the best laid plans can fail. One of my classic experiences of this reality took place when we did a \$1 million expansion at the church I was serving. The expansion included a new nursery - complete with sink and running water, separate play areas for infants and toddlers, as well as a crib and nursing rooms.

We were filled with pride and delight the day we opened the new nursery hoping it would send a clear message to families with young children that they were valued by the faith community. The truth was we were attracting young families and our Sunday school was bursting at the seams.

So, what went wrong? Two new trends were gaining traction. The first was an invention. The all-in-one baby carrier. You know, the bucket-like object that parents carry their babies in? The kind that also serves as a car seat and stroller seat. This allows a parent to remove their child from the car and carry them right into the church. Before long the worship space was filled with small children rocking in their bucket seats while the nursery was barely in use.

The second trend that was unfolding was a growing comfort about nursing in public. Combine the two trends and the need for our state of the art nursery was greatly lessened. Should we have seen it coming? Could we have seen it coming? Perhaps, if we were really tuned in.

What we were tuned into was all the information about how important a state of the art nursery was to young families. The problem was by the time we completed our nursery based on the best current information the world around us had changed.

The truth is this is happening all over the world. Talk to Kodak about film, Blockbusters about video, Swiss watch makers, brick and mortar stores, and Ma & Pa Grocery Stores. All once successful enterprises, they have gone the way of the dinosaurs.

The Living Local Movement that our synod is engaged in takes adapting to change seriously. We believe that God is always up to something new. What we are trying to do by dwelling in God's word is to develop the eyes and ears to see how God is working in our day and time. "Behold I am doing something new. Do you not see it?"

Because we are never 100% sure what God is up to we must probe new ideas, new expressions of what it means to be church, new ways to share the gospel. It isn't that gospel that changes. What changes is how we engage it.

Back to the nursery, the lesson we were learning was in order to engage young families we needed to make worship "kid friendly." Welcoming the occasional cry of a baby is to embrace life. Young families often want a more hands-on experience in worship where they are able to worship God through mediums like music, art and dance. Children find joy in being involved in all aspects of the church. Soft toys and coloring pages representing images of the Bible Story can be a big hit.

And that "state of the art" nursery? What did we do with it? It continued to be modified and used by those for whom it was still of value. Today it is being remodeled one more time to respond to the growing needs of a population of children with special needs. It will once again be sacred space set aside to respond with love and support to the cry of God's children.

I want to encourage all our congregations to be more willing to TRY, FAIL and TRY AGAIN.

God's work. Our hands.

A message from Bishop Unti to congregations -

Friends,

I am sitting on the shore of Lake Chelan enjoying some vacation time with Kim and our four girls. I continue to wake up each morning wondering what turbulent news is going to greet me. The challenge is I could be writing a daily Pastoral Letter in response to these times.

It should go without saying that we in the church must come out four square against all forms of hate, bigotry, racism, and nationalism regardless of who is being targeted. The truth is we are all children of God. This is deeply embedded in our Christian bones.

These times are making it abundantly clear that we have a long way to go in both understanding our participation in the evil that we are experiencing and what our responses might look like.

Fellow Bishop Julian Gordy from the Southeastern Synod has spent his entire pastoral ministry trying to pull the bandaid off of racism and to expose the work of confession and reconciliation that we all need to be involved in.

Listen to his words in a recent post to his fellow bishops:

"Racism is and has always been present everywhere in this country. In the past, it was covered up in some places more than it was in the South, and it certainly wasn't as ugly or as blatant as it was here in the days of segregation. White supremacy is the original sin of America. It explains our history. It explains our treatment of the native populations of this continent and of the waves of immigrants who have come here as well as it explains slavery and Jim Crow. Thinking that we all need to "go down South" to address racism may show an inattentiveness to how white supremacy and privilege are affecting us and our own communities.

The Southern Poverty Law Center has identified and is currently following white supremacist and other hate groups. They exist in every state except Hawaii and Alaska. And while such groups have proliferated in the South in the past 15 years, there are far more of them in California than in Tennessee and Mississippi combined, more in New York than in Georgia, more in Michigan than in Alabama. (Here's the SPLC's interactive map: <https://www.splcenter.org/hate-map>.)

My point is not to deny the reality and the ugliness of what has happened and is still happening in the South, but to say, as Stokely Carmichael said to Will Campbell, the problem is closer to home than you think (my paraphrase). "

Yes, it is alive and well right here in Northwest Washington.

It is why your Synod Council and Roster have participated in Anti - Racism Training. It is why Sunitha Mortha was chosen as our Churchwide speaker for Synod Assembly a year ago. It the reason behind the Synod's support of **Kids and Race** and **Neighbors in Faith**. All these efforts are designed to open the eyes and ears of God's people that we might genuinely love all of our neighbors.

Personally, I believe the most important thing that every person in the pew can do is to meet your neighbors who are currently strangers. Design a block party, have them over for a snack and drinks, or just knock on their door and introduce yourself. Kim and I have had a welcome sign in our yard and this summer it has created many conversations.

Friends, this may be a hot political issue but more importantly to me it is a hot values issue for those of us who know Jesus as Lord and rabbi.

May our hearts and actions reflect the one who died to reconcile the world.

We have an opportunity to accompany our neighbors during and after this disaster, in Jesus Christ's name.


