

Where did the summer go?

As the parent of a soon-to-be kindergartener, I am dumb-founded to realize that August has almost reached its endpoint and September is nearly here. How did that happen?

There are a few things coming up that I want to make sure you are aware of as we move into the fall:

As many of you already know, last year we made a change in the Bible readings we use on Sundays: we switched to what is known as the "Narrative Lectionary" (<http://www.workingpreacher.org/?lectionary=nl>), a series of biblical selections that varies over a 4 year cycle. This fall, we will be entering the Year of Matthew: every Sunday will include a reading from his gospel as either the main preaching text or as complimentary verses to the preaching text. Matthew's take on Christ is especially meaningful for us today: he wrote during the early church at a time when various factions were beginning to argue over the "true" direction for the faith to take. *Dikaosune* or righteousness is a frequent concern: what is required for a right relationship with God (and, by extension, each other)? As we continue to look at our connections to the community, these sorts of questions are important parts of the conversation

Another event coming up is a "State of the Church" address/conversation involving representatives from the various organizations who operate out of this site. As you know, we have been working hard over the last few years to build bridges and develop deeper connections to several of these groups, and this meeting will be a chance to come together on a larger scale and openly discuss the present and future direction of the ministry here. More details will be coming soon, but I anticipate the meeting taking place on a Sunday evening in late September or early October. It will be an open event to the congregation as well: if you are interested in attending, you are more than welcome.

I continue to find delight in the ministry of this place: we occupy a unique and special niche in Shoreline, and it is exciting to explore the possibilities that God has set before us.


BACK TO SCHOOL

You all contributed in some way, whether it was through a donation, washing cars, baking items for the



Love Story with Murders


In her teens, Griffiths had a bizarre psychotic episode (she calls it "my illness"), and it left her unpredictable and perhaps autistic. (Plenty of marijuana and mental exercises help keep the strangeness at bay.) But she is a terrific cop, identifying so strongly with murder victims that she practically reads their minds. "Love Story with Murders" opens with Griffiths called to a grisly discovery: a severed human leg, complete with snazzy pink high-heeled shoe, in a garage freezer in suburban Cardiff. Other body parts soon show up scattered around the city. They belong to two people – a college student and a university lecturer. Griffiths' singular talents finds a link between the victims and possibly to her family as well: the student moonlighted as a stripper, and Griffiths dad is a rascally reformed criminal who once ran a strip club. The result is extraordinary: intense and – despite the grisly stuff- often oddly funny.

I hope to leave on September 18 for four weeks for the next workshop. Tom will go for four weeks in November-December. **Pray** that it will work out well for us all.

Praise God that we have reached 100% of the ministry budget that Wycliffe set for us. Now we will be assigned to fulltime translation again.

LUTHERAN DISASTER RESPONSE PROVIDES ASSISTANCE FOR EBOLA OUTBREAK IN LIBERIA

ELCA News

The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) will provide \$10,000 in humanitarian assistance in response to the Ebola virus outbreak in Liberia. The funds are being disbursed through Lutheran Disaster Response-International to Global Health Ministries at the request of the Lutheran Church in Liberia. Global Health Ministries provides medical supplies and funding for health care programs in Lutheran churches in 20 countries. The funds will help cover air-freight costs to deliver supplies to Monrovia, Liberia. According to a Global Health Ministries press release, the shipment of supplies will include "five pallets of PPEs (personal protection equipment)." In addition, Global Health Ministries is sending a 40-foot container ship that will carry more "urgently needed medical supplies and equipment in care of Phebe Hospital and Curran Hospital." Phebe Hospital, a Lutheran hospital, is the largest public health institution in Liberia.



The Liturgy of September

September is upon us again and I have yet to transition into this month without developing a knot in my stomach. This is where fear takes up residency in my life. I know the source of this fear. It dates all the way back to the first day of school. I never slept well the night before - worried about whether

I would like my teacher, who would I be seated next to, did I know my times tables, and did I have the right clothes to wear? This fear was also dosed with a certain level of excitement and anticipation of what the new year might hold.

When it came time to send our own kids off to school, I relived these same memories as I watched them gear up for the transition. One daughter slept in the new clothes she was going to wear on the first day and was up at O-Dark-Thirty ready to go. Another daughter was sorely disappointed when we woke her up for the second day of kindergarten. "You mean I have to go again?"

Two of my daughters are now public school teachers. I watch them go through their own version of fear and anticipation each year. Little do the students know that their teachers share some of their same feelings about starting a new year. We live two blocks from the elementary school our daughters attended and where our one daughter now teaches. I watch the kids decked out in their new clothes and bright backpacks, chasing after one another as they participate in this annual trek back to school. I watch the school buses whiz by with

kids staring out the windows knowing that some are as scared as I was.

We do not acknowledge the first day of school in our liturgical calendars. Perhaps it does not rise to the proper level of holiness. I wish we did because for me it captures a good deal of what it means to be human. It is about transition and being called to trust the future. It is about facing our fears so that we can stretch and grow. It is about letting go, being vulnerable and discovering new horizons. God never allows us to become a settled people. Summer vacation always comes to an end.

I must confess I enter into my second year serving the office of bishop with many of the same feelings that I had as child gearing up for another year of school. It comes with that same mixture of fear, excitement and anticipation. Friends, for me this is the pathway of faith. It is the constant discovery that future is in God and means us well.

Lord God, you have called your servants to ventures of which we cannot see the ending, by paths as yet untrodden, through perils unknown. Give us faith to go out with good courage, not knowing where we go, but only that your hand is leading us and your love
