

Sarah and I are pretty good at moving. That's not by accident: from our first date in January 2002 to the purchase of our first house in July 2013, we each changed homes NINE TIMES! Let me tell you, that makes it a little trickier than usual when you fill out credit paperwork: "Where have I lived in the past decade? Um...somewhere in Tacoma...I think the street number had a 3 in it..." isn't generally considered a valid response.

When you move that often, you quickly realize that you'll be better off if you can allow yourself to differentiate between "things I truly need to keep," "things I truly want to keep," and "things I truly need to let go of." How you make the determination is less important than that you make it: it frees you from baggage – physical and emotional – and helps with transitions.

Our congregational decision to move from our current location carries with it decisions similar to the ones Sarah and I have made over the years: not only in regards to physical objects, but also when it comes to our values and interests. There are countless things about "Bethel," the building as well as the community, that we take for granted: which ones are the things we want to make an effort to retain in a new location and form? Is it our gathering for breakfasts and other meals? Our growing relationships with some of the groups we host at our site? Our willingness to welcome new people regardless of background? Something else entirely? In the weeks and months to come, we'll be taking opportunities to explore this question as a community. Similar to our decision about selling the site, we'll be using house meetings, one-to-ones, and other ways of openly pondering our various responses to this question.

In a recent conversation, Bishop Kirby suggested a way to approach this topic which could prove helpful: begin by asking yourself questions like "What are things at Bethel that have helped me feel closer to God in the last few years? What experiences there have helped me feel spiritually filled? Where have I gained energy instead of just spending it?" Starting from a place like that should go a long way in regards to helping us make Spirit-lead decisions about what we want a new form for Bethel to look like. And in doing so, we stand a much better chance of making decisions that we'll feel good about in the long term.

In last month's newsletter, I referenced making regular reports to the congregation about our process for selling and finding a new location. On April 12 I delivered an oral report to the congregation with an update on our process thus far, and I will create a written synopsis of that report shortly.

As always, if you have any questions or concerns about things at Bethel feel free to call, email, drop-by, etc: it is vital that we be willing to communicate about the future and approach it through mature conversation. Through God, all things are possible!



A Fresh Look at Pentecost

(May 24th is Pentecost Sunday)

Fifty days after Jesus' resurrection, on a day called Pentecost, the Christian church was born. Because Pentecost was a holiday celebrating the harvest (a

bit like our Thanksgiving), the apostles and a large crowd had gathered to celebrate in Jerusalem. Many people had assembled near Peter and the other followers of Christ when "[From heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind ...]" (Acts 2:2 ff, NRSV). Then tongues of fire descended on everyone in the crowd.

After the wind and fire descended, all sorts of languages, known and unknown, came out of the crowd. Each person spoke "about God's deeds of power" (verse 11). No wonder Luke wrote, "All were amazed and perplexed, saying to one another, 'What does this mean?'" (verse 12).

The whole affair was mind-boggling and life-changing. The Holy Spirit had come upon many people; they knew God was powerfully at work in their midst.

On Pentecost many years ago, some 3,000 people came to believe in Christ. That's why today Christians remember this powerful event as the birthday of the church.

Volunteer Help Needed

Lutheran World Relief (LWR) needs a few more willing people – anyone who can lift 30 pound boxes – to help with the twice-a-year Seattle LWR quilt and kit collection on Friday May 1st from 8am to 3pm, and Saturday May 2nd from 8am to noon. We also need traffic directors to manage the incoming loads, or help with checking cars in, if you cannot lift or do not want to lift.

Volunteers work two-hour shifts – with time off between incoming vehicles for conversation and snacks. This is a physical Tetris game – we stack the boxes 9.5 feet high and 8 feet across in 53-foot long containers. The boxes range from banana and apple boxes to various packing boxes, so loading can be challenging.

This event takes place in the parking lot west of Our Redeemers' Lutheran Church (2500 85th Ave NW). There is also a loading every fall in late October/early November.

Earthquake in Nepal

April 28, 2015

SITUATION OVERVIEW

At 11:41am on April 25th a 7.8 magnitude earthquake struck approximately 50 miles northwest of Kathmandu, according to the US Geological Survey (USGS). Tremors were felt across northern India and neighboring Bangladesh and Pakistan.

- Aftershocks are now unlikely as the 72 hour window has passed
- The most deadly avalanche ever recorded hit Mount Everest and destroyed most of Base Camp 1.



- According to the United Nations Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (OCHA) the most affected areas are Gorkha, Lamjung and Sindhupalchok as well as Kathmandu, Bhaktapur and Lalitpur Districts.

INTERNATIONAL HUMANITARIAN RESPONSE EFFORTS

- LWR is working in close coordination with the Government of Nepal, NGOs, ACT Alliance partners and the UN.
- The ACT Alliance has issued an alert and will be issuing an appeal in the coming days. LWR is an active member of the ACT Forum Nepal and is coordinating with LWF regarding implementation to avoid overlapping areas and to plan complimentary activities where feasible.
- The Government of Nepal has declared a state of emergency and is requesting humanitarian assistance. They have stated the most important need right now is search and rescue, assistance to those injured and clearing debris.
- Infrastructure, telecommunications, health, shelter and WASH needs also remain critical. According to the latest OCHA report, over 1.4 million people are in need of food assistance as well.
- The Government has identified 16 open spaces to be used as camps. Five other shelter camps have also been established in areas belonging to the Armed Police Force.
- Over one million children are estimated to be in need.
- International humanitarian aid agencies are already planning their response in the badly affected areas of Kathmandu; however concern remains high for areas outside of Kathmandu which have been very difficult to reach and assess.
- Death toll numbers and information on total number of houses damaged is still being collected but damage to infrastructure is extensive and the number of deaths is expected to continue to rise.

LWR'S RESPONSE

- LWR is planning on shipping over 9,240 Quilts, 1,000 Personal Care Kits and 100 water filtration units from the UNHRD warehouse in Dubai. The shipment will be departing within the coming days and will arrive shortly after it leaves the warehouse. Distributions will take place in the most affected areas of Kathmandu working with LWR's local partners Lutheran World Federation and the Nepal Red Cross.
- LWR is committing an initial response of \$500,000 and will be responding through long term partner COPPADES and exploring a response including cash transfers and possible NFI distribution in the Lamjung area, where 75% of the houses have been destroyed.
- Staff from LWR's Emergency Operations unit arrived in-country today, with additional Asia regional and Emergency Operations staff prepared to deploy as needed in the coming week.
- LWR has spent the initial hours confirming the safety and security of our staff, local partners, and
- communities in which we work.
- Assessments are underway and coordination meetings with the Government of Nepal, other INGOs and local NGOs are happening daily.
- LWR is currently already working in Lamjung District, where the epicenter of the earthquake was.

LWR IN THE COUNTRY

In Nepal, LWR currently works with local partners on agriculture, food security, climate change adaptation, emergency response and disaster risk reduction (DRR) projects. LWR's work focuses on areas of western Nepal, including a current program based in Lamjung district, the epicenter of the earthquake. Last September, LWR Nepal responded to the severe flooding in Bardiya District, western Nepal, with cash for work, shelter and livelihood recovery programs. LWR began working in Nepal in 2009 to improve food security in for indigenous, Dalit and marginalized communities. De-

spite recent declines in poverty, Nepal remains one of the poorest countries in the world. Rural communities often struggle with household food security and are extremely vulnerable to frequent natural hazards, including flash floods, landslides and earthquakes. Poverty affords communities few resources to prepare for or mitigate the effects of these hazards and even fewer resources to recover, which can destroy development gains. LWR promotes resilience and long-term development in the communities in which it works by better preparing communities for natural hazards and helping families realize food security and savings.
